Looks like the president of the KAMLOOPS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE really stuck his neck out as far as MERRITT people are concerned, when he said that if an instant town was established at LOGAN LAKE, the business would all go to Kamloops as only Kamloops would have what they need.

People here remember when he visited us last fall and talked about co-operation between Merritt, Ashcroft and Kamloops, but apparently it was just talk. There were a few disbelievers at that time and they are now saying "I told you so!"

Kamloops ran into trouble with ASHCROFT last fall when they started making too greedy sounds, and it is quite possible that they will have the same situation on their hands with MERRITT this fall. We know they have a few advantages over us but they don't have to rub our nose in it.

In the meantime the speculation continues as to what is happening in the HIGHLAND VALLEY and the latest I have heard is that a survey crew is now in the Logan Lake area making studies of the town site to see if it is situated on top of any valuable ore bodies. The survey, being conducted by a six man crew under contract by Lornex, is expected to take about two months, and this is the first step towards establishing an instant town.

the two council vacancies, with five candidates in the running.

In 1967, he ran for re-election, and in that year Thane Clarke topped the polls, a newcomer to civic politics, and Ald. Heroux took the second vacancy, and Mr. Nordquist went out of office.

Ald. Heroux served under Mayor Allan Collett, then Mayor George Fillinger in his two years in office, then again under Mayor Allan Collett in this year, 1969.

He said this week, in an interview with the Herald, that he has given the situation a lot of thought and has now made a final decision.

Ald. Thane Clarke, whose term is also up this year, said that he has been changing his mind back and forth for some time "but I imagine I'll probably run unless something very drastic happens before nomination day to make me change my mind."

He said he has served two years on council and feels if he has ever been of any value as an alderman, it would be

now with the experience he has gained. "The next few years are going to be very important ones to Merritt, and a strong council is needed. I would like to be a part of it and do what I can."

In the school board, terms of office are completed this year for school board chairman Gordon McDonald and Trustee Tony Petrina. Both these men won their seats in 1966 when a whopping total of four men offered themselves as candidates for school board, setting a precedent in civic interest. School board members are usually put in by acclamation in most areas, including Merritt, but interest was stimulated that year and in the years since.

Gordon McDonald is away on a hunting trip in Alberta and could not be reached for comment this week, but Tony Petrina was contacted. He said he is giving it a lot of thought and will be making a definite decision soon.
