Message From the CAO

From the lens of local government there were success and challenges, like all years. From a personal standpoint it was a difficult year where we lost a past and sitting Councillor. Both individuals I knew well and will miss them personally and professionally. We benefit from the contributions they provided in the past which has brought us to where we are today.

On the sunnier side of 2023 in Logan Lake, the District was successful in securing a Destination BC grant for nearly \$1 Million to expand the Municipal Campground. We are very excited to see this project underway and this will allow us to welcome more guests annually to Logan Lake! These guests will have many new things to see when they arrive. After extensive consultation Council moved forward with awarding a contract for the building a new skate park within Maggs Park. We look forward to the grand unveiling in 2024.

The Logan Lake Community Forest (LLCF) were also very active around Logan Lake both salvaging the wood that was destroyed in 2021 and providing fire mitigation to prepare the community for future events that we all hope never occur. The harvesting and fire rehabilitation were only a small portion of the overall activity. The District, Highland Valley Outdoor Association (HVOA), the LLCF and the Lower Nicola Indian Band (LNIB) Development Corporation successfully secured disaster relief funds through the Ministry of Forests to redevelop the HVOA trail network. Everyone involved in this project are excited to see the return of recreation activities within this area and a path towards healing from the devastating fires of 2021.

With restoration being big on everyone's minds it was great to welcome back British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT) twice to Logan Lake in 2023. Students took part in a winter limnology course held on Logan Lake, and then returned in September to create two new wetlands and a beaver dam analog (BDA). This was a first for BCIT and the BC Wildlife Federation who took part with the process. We were humbled to have a LNIB elder start the work with a blessing and many of our other indigenous neighbours took part.

Even with all this exciting work happening within the community, we continue to focus on our core services. The District has made large gains in asset management and moving forward with capital improvements. This includes the tendering of the Acreages paving project at the end of 2023. Project planning for large utility projects began in 2023, stay tuned to see these projects move forward in 2024.

Overall, it's an exciting time in Logan Lake. I feel fortunate and privileged to work with the unbelievable people we have on Staff and such a progressive, supportive Council who bring excitement, varied and valuable points of view to all things Logan Lake. Wade Archambault, CAO



2023 Goals and Highlights

Public Works, Parks, and Recreation

Public Works delivers many critical services that communities rely upon including the delivery of clean drinking water, collection and treatment of wastewater, road maintenance, snow removal, solid waste and recycling services and many other essential services. The Parks and Recreation Staff operate and maintain the Recreation Centre, maintain parks, irrigation systems and green the community through annual flower planting.

Some additional projects and highlights in 2023 included:

- Welcomed a new full-time parks and recreation staff position to the District.
- The Recreation Ice plant Installation was completed and commissioned!
- Developed a concept plan for the Downtown Plaza revitalization.
- The District's first Columbarium Wall was added to the Whispering Pines Cemetery.
- Upgrades to the District's radio communications for the water system were completed.
- Work began on a 5-year capital infrastructure rehabilitation plan.
- Public Works crews initiated 3 emergency repairs to the water system and 1 to the wastewater system.
- Installed 28 new LED Streetlights
- The expansion of the Mammette Lake Gravel Pit was approved.
- The District welcomed its 2nd new F150 Hybrid Pickup in 2023
- One of the District's dump trucks got a facelift with a new dump box and drop-in sanding unit.
- Public Works crews completed street sweeping in house in 2023 which allowed for line painting to be completed in early spring.
- The tennis courts were converted to a multi-use court in 2023 which includes basketball, pickleball and ball hockey.
- A new playground was installed within the Campground.
- A day parking area was added to the Campground.
- Completed an irrigation evaluation and assessment audit for Maggs park
- Cleanup of the hotel and plaza flower beds and meridians

Planning and Development

This District continued to provide Planning and Development services in conjunction with the Thompson Nicola Regional District (TNRD). Building permits and inspections are run through the TNRD while the zoning confirmation and approving officer duties are run through the District of Logan Lake.

The District issued a total of 11 Residential Building Permits for a total value of \$2,721,000. The development of the Ironstone Ridge Subdivision continued and the District of Logan Lake sold 7 lots in 2023. Within the community the District issued a total of 84 business licenses in 2023.

Economic Development

The Campground and Visitors Information Center saw a return to normal operating capacity during 2023. This included international visitors, the return of in person events and the celebration of Logan Lake's 50th Anniversary.

Visitor Information Centre (VIC)

The VIC was open for 1459.50 hours in 2023 and was visited by 5,156 people. Additionally 1,102 people were assisted via phone, 336 over email, and 54 on social media channels. The following provides a summary of what the guests asked about and some of the services proved.

The Logan Lake Campground

The Campground was able to have close to a full season with only a minor disruption due to the travel advisory from the Kelowna Wildfires. The 2023 season saw increases in the number of international visitors from Europe with visitors from Spain, Germany, Italy, United Kingdom, etc and from Asia: with Japan and Taiwan leading the way. The Campground was open for 151 nights and produced a total revenue of \$218,620.37 and a profit of \$58,564.47. The following are some of the 2023 highlights were:

- a total of 6020 nights reserved.
- 31 nights sold out.
- 45 nights over 90% capacity
- Average occupancy rate of 85.14%
- Installation of the new playground, redesign of site 33.
- Addition of power to sites 41, 42, and 43.
- The creation of a brand-new site #47.
- Grant of \$992,285 from the Government of BC for the first phase of the campground master plan expansion.
- Campground supported the golf course through the stay and play program which handed out over 1100 golf rounds to campground visitors.
- Hosted the BCIT wetland students.

On top of the Visitor Information Centre and Campground there were several other initiatives and events in 2023. The following is a list of a few of the highlights for the year.

District staff reviewed all Economic Development Strategy reports produced and condensed and updated the findings.




Protective Services


The District Protective Services is a volunteer-based Fire Department with a paid Fire Chief, Doug Wilson, and a total of 25 Firefighters. In total Logan Lake Fire Rescue had 221 emergency response calls in 2023. On top of responding to emergency calls the Department spent 1752 hours in training in 2023. Logan Lake Fire Rescue also conducts a FireSmart Program, oversees emergency support services and conducts fire inspections of public buildings. The Fire Chief also oversees Municipal Emergency Preparedness (MEP) and the Emergency Support Services (ESS) within the community.

Protective Services Highlights for 2023

- The average response time from page out to on scene is 8 min
- The Fire department install 55 Sprinkles on residents homes and completed FireSmart home assessments.
- Logan Lake was deployed 3 times in 2023 Fort St James, Lac Le Jeune. And West Kelowna.
- Supported the WHY with 8 summer students hired to mitigate around the community to the North at the outdoor ski trails.
- Continue to work on fire inspection within the business community
- ESS continued to train on the Aira tool
- Logan Lake Fire/Rescue continues to cross train with other community's and agencies (LNIBFD, SAR, BCEHS, RCMP)


